Only one pattern word fits ciphertext OGMQWMPZGPIUZPDN, SYAOFEXZHETX, WKRLCQNLOCEB.

JF TG-4 Null. AWARE I TIE A FARE I END AD.

LIONEL

A vowel related null.

JF P-10 Patristocrat. Classical Music Bumper Sticker. K2 (96/21) (VIXS)

WORD WIZARD

Crib placement, VUXL = body

- JF P-Sp-2 Patristocrat Construction Plan. K3 (90/19) IZ** **BION**
Red Herring Alert – Those six ciphertext OC’s are not “th.” Try “gl” to lead in search for carpenter constructor.
- JF X-8 Portuguese Patristocrat. K2 Saude Mental (112) (espírito)** **LIONEL**
Plaintext begins “Para.....”
- JF X-11 Dutch Gromark. Nederlandse cryptografie. (cijfers)** **LIONEL**
Expand crib to “cijfers die hersch.....” Place at position 99.” The word before “cijfers” is the same in Dutch as it is in English and is a cryptography term.
- JF E-3 Morbit. Home sweet home. (better) 4 = xx, 6 = dot, dot** **OOBOO**
- JF E-4 Nihilist Transposition. Subtle distinctions. (IRUP)** **APEX DX**
Plaintext begins “The.....”
- JF E-6 Variant. Practical chemistry.** **AURION**
Many chemistry terms in this Period 11 polyalphabetic cipher beginning with a common three-letter word.
- JF E-12 Quagmire I. Error of omission. (toothersnotonly)** **ANCHISES**
Period Seven. Extend crib to read ”toothersnotonlybyhisactions”
- JF C-8 Multiplication Cryptarithm. (Two words, 1-0)** **TWEETY**
Thee digit multiplier, only two partial totals. One of the partial totals must be zero. Try K = 0.
- JF C-13 Duodecimal multiplication. (Three words, 0-B)** **LATIN DUDE**
Three four letter words with respective first letters of O, R G.
- MA A-18, 21, 20 Aristocrats.** **ABACUS, JUDE, PIPPIN**
Only one pattern word fits A-18, NPXJRICIEGQRQ and A-21, OTPTZOEBTOP and only one proper noun, found in most pattern word lists, fits A-20, *UCXNTFZYUO.
- MA P-11 Patristocrat. Preventive maintenance. K3 (100/22) (GOMN)** **ENIGMATIQUE**
Three trigraphs are repeated in this cipher – “old,” “the” and “you.”
- MA P-12 Patristocrat. Say again? K3 !02/23) (Extended crib – down south)** **GIZMO**
- MA E-6 Beaufort. Another motive. (Period nine, begins, Us.....)** **DANEEL**
- MA E-12 Redefence. Tranquility. (Four rails, no offsets.)** **MARSHEN**
- MA C-14 Subtraction. (Two words, 1-0.)** Second word is what Lady Gaga does. **COLD DUCK**
- MA C-Sp-2 Multiplication. (Three words, 0-9)** **THE RAT**
Don’t let the third word, an English term for gentleman or nobleman, lead you astray.
