When solving, **POST CERTAINTIES IN RED** – Correct crib placements which yield additional plaintext, plaintext prompted by Google search, nudges from peers, quotations, poetry or prose passages identified from reading awareness, all generate assured letters which can be turned into words and deserve certainty identification. 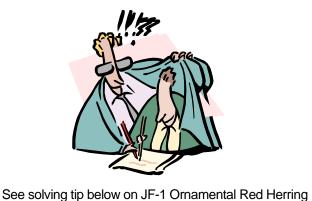

SO. X-6. Swedish. K2. Originated in Sweden? (stress) (English key) Added crib – avkopplande. REAL NEO
<b>SO. X-8. Portuguese Patristocrat. (individuo)</b> Crib placement at position 30. INYUTN=sempre G-MAN
<b>SO. E-5. Fractionated Morse. What he looked like. (parchment)</b> Crib at position 63, begins "Ice blur" <b>BION</b>

Keep in mind that ciphertext letters cannot represent plaintext letters in the same half of the alphabet, thus plaintext "t"
must be represented by ciphertext A thru M. Drag the crib through the plaintext and you will find that the very first
place the crib "today" will fit, near the beginning of the ciphertext, will yield the key letters and much plaintext.
